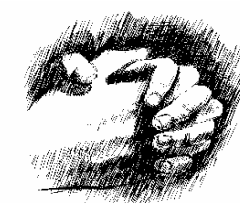

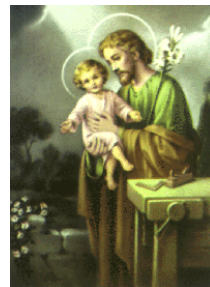

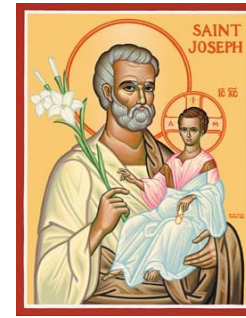
PRAYER TO SAINT JOSEPH PATRON OF FAMILIES



Saint Joseph, please obtain God's grace and protection for my family and for all families. Make our home safe and pure, the kingdom of Jesus and Mary – a sanctuary of peace, joy and love. Your protection is greatly needed today because God's enemies are trying to desecrate and destroy the family. While on earth, you saved the Child and His Mother. So today protect our families and make our homes sanctuaries of prayer, love, patient sacrifice and work. May they be modeled after your own at Nazareth. Remain with us with Jesus and Mary, so that by your help we may obey the commandments of God and of the Church, live a life of prayer and foster religious instruction in our homes. Save us from the evil that

surrounds us, and grant us the grace of going to Heaven to eternally live in the company of the Holy Family. Amen.

Saint Joseph



Saint Joseph was chosen by God to be Jesus' father on earth. God knew that Jesus would need a foster father to raise him and teach him. The Bible tells us that he was a 'just man.' That means he was a good man, honest, fair, and God-loving.

After an angel told Mary that she would be the Mother of God, Saint Joseph wondered what to do. An angel appeared to him in a dream and told him not to worry, that the child was the Messiah, conceived by the Holy Spirit. Joseph was to be her husband and protect the child as He grew. Joseph decided to trust the angel and God. He married Mary and took her into his home.

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem, the angel appeared to Joseph again, warning him that the Child was in danger. Joseph obeyed the angel's message again, and took his family to Egypt to escape from Herod's soldiers. After many years, the Holy Family finally returned to their home village of Nazareth.

Not much else is known about Saint Joseph, the 30 years between the Nativity and the beginning of Jesus' traveling and teaching are called 'the hidden years.' The only other event the Bible tells us about the Child Jesus' life and about Saint Joseph is the Finding in the Temple, when Jesus was missing for three days and finally Joseph and Mary found Him in the Temple teaching the scribes and elders.

Imagine how worried they must have been! God had told them to look after the Child, and they lost him in a crowd. Saint Joseph must have felt that he hadn't done a very good job. When they found Him, they scolded Him a little and returned home to Nazareth. After this, Jesus returned home with Mary and Joseph and 'was subject to them.' That means he was obedient and respectful of their parental authority.

Saint Joseph was probably older than Mary, and probably died before Jesus began his ministry. As a saint in Heaven he still acts as a husband and father to his family and the Church, and will intercede for us on many occasions. He is invoked for aid in selling homes, for help to the poor, support and protection of fathers and families and is the patron of many countries. In 1870 Pope Pius IX declared him patron of the Universal Church.

Saint Rafka



Rafka, the Holy Nun, is known as the Little Flower of Lebanon. One day, while praying in the chapel, Rafka asked to share in Christ's suffering. She wanted to offer herself to God as victim of love. To carry her cross, Rafka did not want to flee like the apostles at the time of His passion. Rather, she wanted to share in Christ's agony and death.

God's answer was swift. She felt an excruciating pain in her head, especially her eyes. This pain was to increase and last a lifetime. Soon Rafka became not only blind, but also paralyzed. She was totally incapable of sight or movement. Yet she never complained. She was happy, thanking God for his kindness and loving him fully. In return, she received many signs from heaven to show her Beloved was near or to know His will in her life. She twice heard voices, had dreams once, enjoyed a vision of heaven. Many miracles followed her death.

Rafka's story may seem odd to some because she prayed for pain. She chose the path of physical pain and rejoiced in it to prove her love of the Lord. Former Maronite Bishop Francis Zayek explains it well: "Both prayer and suffering are necessary for the Christian ascetic and his sanctification. Prayer enlightened Rafka to the necessity of penance for purification. Therefore, suffering and prayer are intimately connected. Not only does one exclude the other, but also each is insufficient without the other. Prayer not only helps us to endure and accept sufferings, it alleviates them and even brings us to glory and triumph through them.

Saint Rafka followed in the footsteps of the Master. With Him she ascended to Calvary. Our belief is that she now shines in His glory."
