### Did you know?

Today is the thirty-fifth anniversary of the Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision which legalized abortion.

For 35 years Christians have worked to restore the basic right to life, which John Paul II said was the foundation for all other rights in society.

Today, we have perform acts of penance both in reparation for crimes against human dignity caused by abortion and in intercession to God to grant wisdom to our nation and civil leaders, that they might know and protect life from conception to natural death.

Christians work without violence to proclaim human dignity. In his first encyclical, *Deus Caritas Est*, Pope Benedict insisted, "a pure and generous love is the best witness to the God in whom we believe and by who we are driven to love" (no 31).

## *Sunday of the Righteous and Just*

The feast of The Righteous and Just (All Saints) is celebrated in the West on November 1st. Originally the word "saint" was synonymous with martyr, i.e., someone who witnesses faith in Christ even to death. After a martyr's death, local Christians endeavored to bury the body in a tomb that would be accessible to the faithful. On the anniversary of the martyr's death, the faithful would gather to pray and celebrate the Eucharist "in memory of those athletes of the Christian faith who have gone before, and to train and make ready those who are to come hereafter." Eventually, the memorial celebration of martyrs occurred in local churches that did not have tombs. By the fifth century there was already a feast of "righteous and just" in the East, on the Friday of Easter week, which was called "all saints" in the West (Roman Church). By the eighth century the Church of "St. Mary of the Martyrs" in Rome seems to have celebrated a similar feast.

In the ninth century Pope Gregory IV changed the date of this feast to November 1st. From the beginning those who had endured torture for the faith, but did not face death (martyrdom), were given the title "confessors" who were actually treated with great respect and dignity. Eventually, Christians who led heroic gospel-inspired lives were often acclaimed after their death as a saint by a local church. The theology and the celebration of this unique feast emphasize the bond between those Christians already with God and those who are still on earth.

We hear so much of the "communion of saints", the faithful on earth, in purgatory and in heaven. It is mentioned in the third article of the Apostles' Creed and probably dates from the late fourth century. In the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians, we learn that all who share the one spirit through the one baptism become one body in Christ. It is also called by Pope Pius XII *Mystici Corporis*, i.e., "The Mystical Body of Christ" [1943]. All the faithful on earth, in purgatory, and in heaven share the common life of the mystical body of Christ. Manifestations of the common life of the communion of saints on earth are in union with the ecclesiastical community, meaning union with the Universal Church, built on Peter and his successors. Also just as equal are the following:

- Participation in the sacraments, particularly the Eucharist;
- Other forms of common prayer, including prayer for one another; common service to others;
- The love produced and urged by the spirit who animates the ecclesiastical community in its sacramental participation, prayer and service.

Prayer for the dead is an ancient custom by which the faithful on earth and in heaven care for those in purgatory. Tertullian and Augustine teach that suffering after death might be relieved by the intercession of the living, and they both mention the practice of offering the Eucharist for the dead. In organizing the teachings of the earlier prayer system on purgatory, Gregory I, in the sixth century, teaches clearly that the prayers of the faithful (offering of the Eucharist) on earth and of the saints in heaven could aid in obtaining the release of those in purgatory.

In the medieval period, prayer for the dead became strongly associated with the notion of satisfying the penalty for forgiven sins. The Council of Florence (1439) explained suffrages as "the sacrifice of the mass, prayers, alms, and other religious activities which, according to the laws and customs of the church, the faithful normally offer." Furthermore, the Council of Trent (1563) affirmed that "a purgatory exists and the souls detained in it can be assisted by the suffrages of the faithful."

The Righteous and Just (saints) in heaven are in a position to assist not only those in purgatory but also the faithful on earth, who have honored them in heaven and sought their intercession from the earliest days of Christianity. Honoring the Righteous and the Just (Saints) includes imitation of them, prayers addressed to them, reverence given to their relics and the right use of icons (images). Prayer asks the intercession of the saints with God and honors God's holy creatures, so giving honor to the creator, the source of all holiness. It is important to note the following: (A) It is more common in the East than in the West to reverence the icons (images of the saints). (B) It is common in both East and West to reverence relics of the saints. And (C) It is commonly known that prayers and reverence are paid not to these material realities but to whom or what they represent for the faithful in order to honor the saints and to glorify God for such examples.
